

LABOR MAN TO RUN FOR LONDON RIDING

Socialist in West Hamilton — Fire in Church Organ—80- Year-Old Man Dead.

William M. McLean, of Smithville, is dead.

F. J. Flatman will contest the West Hamilton riding for the Socialists.

The population of Cobalt is given as 6,100, an increase of 1,000 over last year.

Baroness Von Suttner, the well-known peace advocate, is dead at Vienna.

The city of Stratford was visited by 200 members of the Edmonton Industrial Association.

The suffragets attempted to interrupt the services in three London churches and were ejected.

Over 400 members of the Ohio Bankers' Association are making a trip through the Northern lakes.

The German newspapers are sharply criticizing the triple alliance of Great Britain, France, and Russia.

William Ritche, an 80-year-old Orangeville retired farmer, was found dead on the floor of his bedroom.

As the result of injuries from the kick of a colt, John M. Robinson, a farm laborer at St. Catharines, is dead.

The members of the Rochester Chamber of Commerce were welcomed by the Kingston Board of Trade.

Twelve women and children were drowned near Syracuse, when the launch in which they were riding, capsized.

After an illness of several months E. W. Chambers, a well-known agriculturalist, died at his home at Woodstock.

Over 500 members from Toronto took part in the first annual parade of the Holy Name Society at St. Catharines.

The First Methodist Church at St. Thomas had a narrow escape from fire when a blaze was discovered in the organ motor.

The strains from a gramophone on a steamer bound for Buenos Ayres were carried by wireless to a vessel 200 miles away.

Mistaking a box of pills for candies, Margaret Miller, a five-year-old Hamilton girl, died before medical aid could be given.

Lodges from Detroit, London, St. Thomas, and Walkerville participated in the anniversary services of the Windsor Oddfellows.

Fire from an unknown cause damaged the lumber yards of F. Villeneuve and Company at Walkerville to the extent of \$2,000.
