Announcement that the Dominion government will pay an allowance of \$20 per month to such families of volunteers of the Canadian expeditionary force as may have no sufficient means of support, should not be supposed to interfere with the necessity of the Patriotic Fund. The government does well, because a probability already exists that the Patriotic Fund, even though it swell to millions as it will, will be less than needed. The Patriotic Fund standard is to make up to each family a certain figure of support. As an illustration, a family of a wife and three children, not receiving aid from the husband's pay, was to be allowed \$45 a month—a dollar and a half a day. If part of the husband's pay were to go to the family—and in every case this was to be promoted—the Patriotic Fund was to allow less. If the government now is to give \$20 a
