

# MYSTERIOUS AIR CRAFT WAS AGAIN SEEN YESTERDAY

Reported by Citizens to Have  
Hovered Over the City in  
Broad Daylight.

CAPTAIN OF STEAMER  
MAJOR SAW IT

Machine Arose From Michi-  
gan Side at 4 O'Clock and  
Was Two Hours in Air.

For the second time the mysterious aeroplane, which has been reported to have been seen about the city at night, was sighted during daylight hours yesterday. It was first seen during the day time on Thanksgiving Day, when people attending the sham battle at the wireless station reported it.

Yesterday afternoon it was visible from four o'clock until six-thirty. It was seen by many, among whom are Raymond Miron, motorman at the ship canal; Chas. Hodgins, foreman at the New Ontario Dock, and the captain of the steamer Major, which was tied up at the New Ontario Dock.

One young man, who would not permit publication of his name, said it was visible to him for the greater part of the time from four until six o'clock. He was driving in from the country, and says the machine arose from some distance back of the Michigan Soo, in a direct line with the wireless station there. It proceeded in a northerly direction towards the Canadian border. At first the observer was of the opinion that the dark object in the sky was a kite, but on it coming closer and from his observation of the aeroplane that made an exhibition flight over the city here last summer, he became convinced that the object of his attention was an aeroplane.

He distinctly states that the machine would be proceeding along at a slow rate, and would then dive low at a tremendous rate of speed and then arise again.

After watching it for nearly an hour, during which time it had descended to near the level of the river, the young man saw it return whence it came, but a few minutes later it made another ascent and came directly towards the Canadian ship canal. Low over it after a few manoeuvres and then progressed towards the steel plant. It is also reported that it was seen shortly after six o'clock over the steel plant by men engaged there, but their names cannot be obtained.

The young man who observed the flight of the aeroplane admits that he was heretofore somewhat dubious about an aeroplane being active in this vicinity, but claims that without a doubt he saw one yesterday.

Col. S. L. Penhorwood, commanding the 51st Soo Rifles, asks that any who observe such flights in the future immediately telephone the military headquarters. He said that the information should be forwarded, no matter whether from one of the farms around the city or from a private residence here.
