(Special to The Edmonton Journals Ford's Olisses OTTAWA. Ont., Oct. 28.—A plan to deal with the Germans and Austrians in Canada was adopted by the cabinet in a special meeting neld at noon today. An order in council was passed which will be signed by the governor-

general late this afternoon, when an official statement will be made by Sir George E. Foster, acting premier. It is believed the scheme provides for the as believed the scheme provides for the establishment of registry offices in all large centres and in places where there are colonies of alien enemies. They will be required to register. Those who are not of military age will be given permits to leave the

country if they wish to do so, or to move freely. Others will be required to report every so often and will be kept under surveillance. As there are hundreds of Austrians and Germans unable to get employment and not al-lowed to leave the country, it is felt that they must not be permitted to starve and become a burden on municipalities. Concentration camps will be established at various points, where they

can be fed and, where possible, put to work. As far as practical they will be put at useful work and one proposal Rocky Mountain Parks.
