

ENGLAND'S CAMPS FOR PRISONERS ARE CONSIDERED BEST

Interned Germans Enjoy Physical and Mental Comfort —Food is Good

LONDON, Nov. 20.—Investigation of the condition in the concentration camps in England and Germany all goes to prove, so far as the prisoners in England are concerned, that they enjoy vastly superior bodily and mental comfort. At Dorchester where there are nearly 1,000 interned, the food is wholesome and sufficient, while facilities are given for recreation and study. United States investigators in Germany, though they have not yet reported officially, have stated to a journalist that the English prisoners suffer both from lack of nourishment and from unsanitary conditions.

Reports from Vienna show a more satisfactory state of things as regards Austrian treatment of prisoners.

The feeling of the German prisoners at Dorchester camp has been expressed in a unique testimonial to Congregational Chaplain Holmes, who on relinquishing his duties, received a pair of silver candle sticks, inscribed in German: "To our esteemed pastor." An illuminated address with 100 signatures accompanied the gift.
