

Teutonic Names Are Also Barred

Pullman Company Finds it Doesn't Pay to Send "Bismarck" to Canada

A good instance of the feeling of the patriotic Canadian towards anything that smacks of Germany can be seen almost any day at the Union Station. The Canadian will have nothing of the Kaiser's Empire, no even a name, and as a result Pullman cars bearing German names have been put on the travelers' black list. Recently when a G. T. R. train bearing a Pullman car named "Bismarck" drew out of the depot at 8 a.m. the Teutonic-named car contained only three passengers, and these were certainly not Canadians. Other cars bearing names that did not have any relation to German "Kultur" were crowded to capacity.

The Pullman conductor did not appear surprised at the way in which the majority of the travelers looked at the inscription, "Bismarck" on the Pullman and then passed along to the next car. He stated that one patriotic Canadian, who had a through ticket to Chicago, and had lower 6 in the "Heidelberg," refused to go into the car and insisted upon being transferred to a car carrying a name, which, under present conditions, was more in keeping with his sentiments. The railway authorities had to fall in with his wishes.
