

# BELGIAN RESERVISTS QUARTERED IN CAMP

Are Provided With Rations and  
Accommodation by Militia  
Department

## STANLEY GUARD CHANGE

Body Guard Relieve Highland-  
ers at Barracks—Major  
Harris Arrives

Recently the Militia Department issued instructions that all Belgian reservists whose bona fides were accepted by the Belgian consul, should be provided with accommodation in the concentration camp at the Exhibition Grounds until such time as arrangements could be made to transport them to Belgium, and today the first batch have come to camp. Seven men presented themselves and six were accepted by the camp surgeons, the other proving physically unfit. They are quartered in the Government building, and receive free accommodation and rations. Altogether there will be twenty men in the first party, and, as soon as these are all assembled, they will be sent to Europe by the first available vessel.

On Saturday next the 48th Highlanders will be relieved from duty at Stanley Barracks, where they they have been on guard for some weeks past. They will be replaced by members of the Governor-General's Body Guard, one hundred and fifty of whom were detailed off for the work yesterday evening. They will remain on duty for three weeks.

### Major Harris Arrives.

Major E. M. Harris, Canadian Permanent Army Service Corps, of Quebec, arrived in camp this morning to take command of the Divisional Supply Column. He and Captain Milson are the only two permanent officers on the Army Service Corps. Both are now in camp here as the whole A.S.C. strength of the second contingent is being concentrated in Toronto.

Great coats were the order of the day out at the camp this morning, the bitter wind and penetrating snow driving all men not forced to drill, into the warmth of the Exhibition buildings.
