AUSTRIAN PRISONERS ARE OFF TO PETAWAWA

Fifty Taken From Stanley Barracks Preparatory to Going on Government Work.

Fifty Austrian prisoners of war, rom Stanley Barracks, are to be aken to Petawawa to-night, pre-taratory to being employed on Government work. To-morrow a number of Germans are to be taken from the barracks and interned in Fort Henry, Kingston. A guard of twenty men will be necessary to look after the transportation of the Aus-

rians and each soldier will be heav-ly armed.

There are now some 90 prisoners of war in the detention camp, which is filled to full apacity. The removal of a portion of the Austrians and the Germans fill make room for 25 prisoners who have been interned at Niagara Falls and Sault Ste. Marie, awaiting shipment to the barracks. ment to the barracks.

The military authorities are still waiting replies from the commanding officers of the different regiments of this military division as to the number of men they can conditibute to the three new battalions, or 2,300 men, which are to be raised.
