

# FIFTY OR SIXTY PRISONERS OF WAR FOR CLAY BELT FARM

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## T. C. Railway Sale at Hearst Recently Was Very Successful.

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Hearst, Dec. 15.—Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Hooper, of Cochrane, were visitors in town on Tuesday and Wednesday, leaving on Thursday by the A. C. R. train.

Messrs. William and Matthew Mulvaney paid our town a short visit this week.

Mr. C. W. Bissell, of Escanaba, Michigan, spent the week in town, making arrangements for the shipping of the pulp wood, which will be taken out around Hearst this winter.

Mr. E. Pellow, of Chapleau, arrived in town this week with thirty men to cut and take out pulpwood. Mr. Pellow expects to deliver 3,500 cords to the sidings at Hearst before spring.

It is from good authority that we learn of the Dominion Government putting some fifty or sixty prisoners of war to work on some land at a point fifty miles east of Hearst on the T. C. Ry. Until they get camps built, the prisoners will live in boarding cars supplied by Messrs. O'Brien, McDougal and O'Gorman.
