

"SPELL IT 'KAYSER,'" SAYS WILHELM KAISER

ALIEN DOESN'T WANT TO BE TANGLED UP IN NAME WITH WAR LORD OF EUROPE.

"We've got a prisoner outside there," said Captain Wandless when a reporter for The Globe entered the alien registration office yesterday.

The reporter went outside to see what a "prisoner" looked like. A number of men were sitting in the ante-room. "Which is the prisoner?" asked the reporter of the policeman at the door.

"That chap in the corner."
The chap in the corner looked very content in his prisonership, and seemed the happiest of all the allens there. "He has no work and doesn't like the food he is getting at the House of Industry and has insisted on being arrested as an allen enemy," explained Captain Wandless.

One of the men registering stated that he had taken out naturalization papers ten years ago, but had lost them. "There are many such cases as these," said the assistant registrar. "I have no use for the Kaiser," said Wilhelm Kaiser who was registering. He asked the registrar to spell his name, Kayser," to show that he was distinct and different from the German Emperor.

BOARD OF TRADE'S GIFT.

The Toronto Board of Trade yesterday forwarded to the Belgian Consul-General in Canada the sum of \$20,000 in cash for Belgian relief, thus supplementing its initial gift of \$20,000 worth of flour a few weeks ago. The Board is also shipping 100 dozen men's heavy sweaters. The Board's fund will remain open for contributions until April, and all moneys are being administered entirely without cost.

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN TRAIN SERVICE, CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY.

Commencing January 17, 1915, the following changes will take place and remain effective until further notice:
Train No. 25, leaving Toronto 9.15 a.m. daily except Sunday, and train No. 26, arriving Toronto 6.40 p.m. daily except Sunday, will be operated between Toronto and Coldwater only, connection to and from Port McNicoll being made at Coldwater. Train No. 755, leaving Toronto 11.30 a.m. daily except Sunday, arriving Hamilton 12.33 p.m., will be withdrawn, and train No. 764, leaving Hamilton 9.15 p.m. daily, arriving Toronto 10.18 p.m., will be withdrawn. Train No. 18, leaving Montreal 6.35 p.m. for St. John, N.B., and Halifax, N.S., now runs daily except Saturday from Montreal, therefore Train No. 20, leaving Toronto 9 a.m. daily, makes direct connection at Montreal for St. John and Halifax daily except Saturday. BELGIAN RELIEF FUNDS.

The contributions to the Belgian Relief Fund is reaching the Belgians through the medium of the American and Spanish Consuls at Brussels. The Relief Committee of Canada and the United States has the word of the British and German Governments that relief ships will not be interfered with. The ships go from United States to Rotterdam, a neutral port, and from there the supplies are shipped to Brussels for distribution. Mr. Clarence I. DeSola, Belgian Consul, states that the arrangements are complete, and no contributor need have any fear about money or supplies not reaching the stricken Belgians. Up to the present \$1,300,000 has been distributed in relief. This does not include recent collections in any of the cities.
