

30 PRISONERS OF WAR

Members of Canadian Contingent Sent Back Home

OTTAWA, Jan. 9.—Thirty men who left as members of the first Canadian contingent are now back in the Dominion under detention as prisoners of war. They were sent back from Salis-bury camp. Almost the entire 30 were men of German or German-American origin. Before the contingent left Canada a number of them had fallen under suspicion. As a result a number of them were arrested and are now back in Canada.

Many applications are being made for the release of prisoners of war held by Canada from themselves and from their friends. However, they are not likely to be many applications granted because none of the men were confined until after a careful examination in each case.
