

Aliens Flock to Register Names

Policeman Was Needed to Regulate Crowd at Office Today

It required the services of a policeman to regulate the traffic into and out of the Registration Bureau for Alien Enemies for a short period this morning, so heavy was the flow of alien enemies into the office on this the last day allowed for formal registration.

On Saturday about one hundred and twenty aliens asked for identification cards for the first time, and probably two hundred will report to-day for the first time. Altogether the names of about 3,500 foreigners are registered on the books of the bureau, and the majority are Golicans who have been working as laborers in and around Toronto. Very few of the aliens registered are women, but the registrar has not been anxious to have the women enrolled.

A large number of those enrolled to-day claimed that they were not reservists, but a suspiciously large number of these men gave as the reason for their exemption from military duty that they had "sick feet."

According to present arrangements, squads of soldiers from the second contingent will make a search of the foreign quarters to-morrow for unregistered aliens who are subjects of countries at war with Great Britain. Lieut.-Col. H. M. Elliot has notified Captain Wandless of the Registration Bureau that he can have all the soldiers he requires.
