

ARREST FOLLOWS GERMAN'S VISITS TO ALIEN ENEMIES

Because he failed to report, according to orders, to the police, but, instead, went out of town, first to Stillwater and later to Powell river, where he was found to be paying visits to his countrymen and other alien enemies, Fritz Plump, a German, who is well-known to the authorities, having within the past year been released from the penitentiary, after serving a portion of a 15-year sentence, was picked up by the provincial constable at Powell river and brought down to Vancouver.

Plump had aroused the suspicions of the officer by his visits to Germans and Austrians in the District and, upon inquiries being made, it was found that he, in company with a woman, was registered at the hotel under an assumed name. The officer thereupon took him in charge and brought him to this city, where he was handed over to the city police, and Mr. Malcolm R. J. Reid, superintendent of immigration, at once arranged for Fritz to be sent to Nanaimo, where he will be kept under surveillance until the close of the war at least.
