

NATURALIZATION PAPERS REFUSED TILL END OF WAR

All Applications Will Be Turned
Down by Registrar of
Alien Enemies

FEAR EXODUS TO THE STATES

Exeats Refused and One Ger-
man Interned For Anti-
British Statements

There will be no more naturaliza-
tion papers granted to alien enemies
till after the war, according to the
decision of Registrar of Alien En-
emies.

"The reason," said Mr. A. J. Rus-
sell Snow, K. C., in refusing the ap-
plication of a German who had been
in this country eight years, coming
here from England, "is that I have
information that naturalization pa-
pers are being used by former aliens
who want to get across the border
into the United States. They speak
of this country in worse terms after
they have got their papers than they
did before."

Busy Time.

The office of the Registrar is
busier since the sinking of the Lusit-
ania than it has been for three or
four months past. The feeling en-
gendered against Germany is shown
in an increase in applications for
exeats, and in numerous complaints
that Germans have expressed anti-
British sentiments.

Exeats were refused yesterday to
Alfred Kussell, whose internment
was seriously considered; Peter Sch-
werdtner and Fedko Berezyszyn.
"You are the sort of Germans who
would make good Canadians. You
can't go," said the Registrar, who
gave instructions that no permis-
sions were to be granted to go be-
yond the eight-mile radius from To-
ronto without his express permis-
sion.

August Bacher, friend of Carl
Loch, who was interned this week
for anti-British statements, follow-
ed his friend yesterday on a
similar charge. His present ad-
dress is 259 Brunswick avenue. He
was born in Cologne 27 years ago,
and has been in Canada 6 years.
