

GERMANS WANT TO GET AWAY.

Tried to Hire Motor Boat To Go To Cape Vincent.

Two Germans, at five o'clock on Wednesday morning, made their way to the boathouse of William Bird at the foot of O'Kill street and inquired from him if he could furnish them with a boat and someone to run it for them so that they might reach Cape Vincent. The Germans appeared to be about twenty-five years of age. Mr. Bird told a Whig reporter, seemed to be quite restless and in a hurry to leave the city. At first they demanded that he produce a boat, thinking that he was only trying to put them off. However Mr. Bird insisted that he did not have anything else besides a row-boat, and the journey was too far to make the trip in this way. He told the Germans that the best thing they could do was to go down to the Cape ferry and go across in this way. Both went away and were not seen again.
