

IMMIGRATION AFTER THE WAR

J. O. Curwood, writing in the *Journal of the Society of Arts*, expresses the opinion that the close of the war will witness a renewal and increase in the migration to Canada. After the war of 1870, he says, 200,000 Germans settled in the States of Nebraska, Minnesota and Iowa alone. After the present war, he looks for a greater corresponding movement from all Continental Europe. The movement will not, he thinks, be towards the United States, because the supply of virgin soil there is exhausted. Canada and Australia, he thinks, will divide the inflow between them.
