

MILLION GERMANS TO U. S. SINCE BEGINNING OF CENTURY

One Out of Every Thirteen Immigrants Was of German Race
From 1900 to 1914.

Contrary to general impression, German immigration to the United States during the past fifteen years has been an important factor. Over a million Germans (1,020,293) landed in the period from June 15, 1910, to June 15, 1914. One out of every thirteen of all immigrants during this period of fifteen years was German by race.

The statement is often found in newspaper and magazine articles that German emigration has fallen off notably; this is true as compared with the great exodus from Germany in the early eighties, but since 1900 the emigration from Germany itself has remained fairly constant at about thirty-four thousand annually, and of Germans from all lands, including Russia and Austria, at seventy thousand each year.

Immigration of Germans in 1913 and 1914 was over twice as great as in 1900 and 1901, and for the last six years has been increasing.

Nearly one-half of these are Germans from Austria or Hungary, about one-tenth come from Russia, and there are also many Germans from the Polish provinces, and not a few from Switzerland.
