

MOTOR VEHICLE ACT MAY BE CHANGED

SAFETY LEAGUE WILL PROBABLY ASK GOVERNMENT FOR ALTERATIONS.

At a meeting of the Ontario Safety League the Legislation Committee, consisting of Messrs. James H. Forrest, Chairman; Geo. H. Gooderham, M.P.P., P. E. Doolittle, M.D., David Archibald, H. H. Couzens and R. C. Harris, was asked to report upon the street traffic code prepared by the Safety First Federation of America, New York. This code embodies the experience of the best traffic experts in the United States, and is the result of considerable labor and experience.

The Legislation Committee will probably ask the Ontario Government to make certain alterations in the motor vehicle act to cover the code mentioned.

Mr. R. B. Morley, Secretary-Treasurer of the league, has been granted leave of absence from the end of this month in order to take the post of Assistant Adjutant in the 170th Overseas Battalion, C.E.F.

NO LICENSE TO BE GIVEN TO ALIEN ENEMIES

ONTARIO LICENSE BOARD WILL ALSO CANCEL LICENSES OF PRO-GERMANS.

In line with public opinion the Ontario License Board has resolved that no license will be given to people born in hostile countries who have not taken out naturalization papers. As much as this has been hinted by the Commissioners before, but a resolution has recently been adopted setting out a definite rule of policy. Inquiry has brought the further assurance that the Board will act in broader fashion than this if necessity demands, and any license-holder, naturalized or not, and no matter what nationality, who gives utterance to pro-German sentiments will not retain his license long. It is understood that a number of cases are under investigation at present, the people reported, it is alleged, having given utterance to views while "under the influence" which they would have suppressed in normal discreet moments.

Ontario Immigration Work Grant is Cut in Half

The war has made its impress on Ontario immigration work, the grant for 1914-15 having been cut in half as compared with the previous year. For propaganda purposes, bonuses, etc., the amount for the year figured \$48,579, against \$101,609 in the preceding twelve months. There was a reduction from \$45,000 to \$26,000 in propaganda work in Great Britain, and the \$10,000 grant to the Salvation Army was saved.
