As a German, may I speak through the medium of the press to the Ger-man people of our Dominion? I have no doubt that there may have been times when German-Ca-

nadians think that their - feelings have been burt, perhaps by some remarks which have been made either through the press or, it may be, by some one who has expressed feelings of contempt for the Germans But when we stop to think of the awful deeds of cruelty which the German soldiers have committed against the women and children and old men of Belgium, and of their unrighteous methods of fighting unrighteous methods of fighting with liquid fire and gas, and also the murder of innocent people with Zeppelins and submarines, as they did with the Lusitania, it must be Zeppelins and Lusitania, it mus-did with the Lusitania, it inter-admitted they have violated inter-national law and decency, and we have been we hear people express contempt for them.

Is it not human nature to strongly speak out against such diabolical And I think that we as a crimes ? German people, ought to forbear with those who may express their feelings against the German nation, and yet have no unkind feeling to the German people in this country. We, as German people, have always been respected until this war com-menced. Now there has been a bit-

ter feeling created in the hearts of fer feeling created in the nearts of some against the German people, which I-expect will take a lozg time to die out, all through the crimes which the German army has com-mitted by order of the Kaiser.
