

72ND ANNIVERSARY OF TRINITY EAST CHURCH

OLD CHURCH WAS BUILT IN THE
THEN FASHIONABLE PART OF
THE CITY.

The rector of Trinity East Church announced to the congregation yesterday that it was the 72nd anniversary of the church, which makes it one of the oldest, if not the oldest, church building in which service is held in Toronto. The residential part of the city surrounded the church when it was built, and it stood in a park. The corner-stone was laid by the late Bishop John Strachan in 1843, and the church was opened the next year. The names of those who were baptized (and there were thousands), as registered in the books, were parents of many families that now reside in Rosedale and College Heights. More marriages have taken place there than in any other church in the city, and difficulties have been met which do not often happen to any one congregation.

Registration of Aliens in Waterloo County

Berlin, Ont., Feb. 27.—The third request of the City Council for the establishment of a court for the registration of aliens of enemy birth has been complied with by the Department of Justice. Yesterday notices were distributed throughout Berlin, Waterloo and vicinity, requesting all aliens of German, Austrian and Hungarian birth to register. Sixty responded yesterday, and a rush is expected during this week. Chief of Police O'Neill has been appointed Registrar, and is being assisted by a number of the Dominion police staff.

156 GONE FROM LEAMINGTON.

ESSEX LIBERAL STAND-BY IS GONE

JOHN B. COUSINEAU WAS PRE-
SENT AT EVERY CONVENTION
IN 48 YEARS.

Windsor, Feb. 27.—After an illness of several weeks, John B. Cousineau, well-known in Essex county Liberal circles for half a century, died at his home here to-day. He was seventy-four years old. An attack of ptomaine poisoning he suffered some time ago caused the breakdown.

Born in Ohio, Mr. Cousineau came to Sandwich in 1846, and resided in Essex county continuously ever since. He served as fisheries inspector for several years, but retired seven years ago. For forty-eight years he had never missed a Liberal convention in the county.
