

100 MILLION BUSHELS YET TO BE MOVED OUT

At Present Rate Will Take
Nearly 200 Days to Ship
Crop East

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Winnipeg, March 3.—After six months there have been taken out of the west 272,116,000 bushels of the total crop of 721,000,000 bushels. There remain in the country elevators 55,019,300 bushels, the remainder being in granaries on the farms and on the land generally.

According to the most reliable estimates obtainable, there are yet to be moved from the west between 100,000,000 and 115,000,000 bushels of all grains, although these figures chiefly represent wheat.

The present rate of movement averages some 500 cars a day passing through Winnipeg. At this rate it would require nearly 200 days more to complete the movement of the present crop.

FEDERALLY INCORPORATED.

Ottawa, March 3.—(Special.)—The Frost Steel & Wire Company, Limited, of Hamilton, has been Federally incorporated, with a capital stock of \$6,000,000. The incorporators include H. L. Frost, A. L. Pope and C. A. Smith of Hamilton and Richard Harcourt of Welland. The company is empowered to manufacture fences, gates, posts, etc.

THEFT, BIGAMY, PRISON.

Ottawa, March 3.—George W. Martin of Calgary was sentenced to one year in the Ontario Reformatory when he pleaded guilty to-day to charges of theft and bigamy. Martin came east some time ago, and, cutting a wide swath on \$2,200 belonging to L. G. Charlebois of Calgary, he met and married an Ottawa woman. It developed that he already had a wife in Calgary.

Y.M.C.A. AT FORT HENRY.

Kingston, March 3.—(Special.)—Social, educational and religious work at Fort Henry **internment** camp, where Germans and Austrians are confined, has been taken in charge by the Young Men's Christian Association. H. M. Peach of Alton, Ill., has established headquarters at the fort to look after the work.
