alguature of his part in the dynamit-ing plots and seriously implicating Albert Kaltschmidt, wealthy Detroit pro-German who some time ago was indicted by the Essex county grand

juryas being the instigator of the outrages.

The confession, which according to the crown, was given to the Walk-

erville police following his arrest on Aug. 29, was admitted by Chief Jus-tice Falconbridge despite vigorous objection by defence counsel. The document stated that on the night of June 20 Respa placed dynamite, fuses and clocks under the Peabody factory in Walkerville, which was working on uniforms for the British army, and under the Windsor armories. The confession added that Kaltschmidt had promised Respa \$200 for the two jobs and that Kaltschmidt had stated that "We'll get the whole place." The confession further stated that Kaltschmidt kept stores of dynamite in his garage ni Detroit and had on several occasions taken dynamite from Detroit to Windsor.
