

BRIDEGROOM IS FINED AND HELD BY MILITARY

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)

Windsor, March 14.—Six days ago Christian Triffle, twenty-four, a resident of Walkerville for eight years, and who has been employed at a plant there working on war munitions, crossed the river to Detroit to wed Miss Anna Geise. Following the wedding Triffle and his bride took the ferry back to Windsor, but when they tried to get past immigration officers both were detained, Triffle having failed to obtain permission before leaving the country, as required by the new regulations governing aliens.

Triffle and his bride, it is said, are both of German descent. This did not help matters any, and the discovery that among the bridegroom's belongings were several very lurid pictures caused the authorities to order Triffle's arrest. He was fined \$32 and costs in Walkerville Police Court to-day, and following the settlement of this case the man was again arrested by Immigration Officer Kold as an alien enemy who had neglected to report himself to the authorities.

Triffle, it is understood, will be held by the militia authorities here until his record can be investigated.

TWO MORE BATTERIES.

London, Ont., March 14.—It was announced to-day that two new batteries of artillery are to be raised in the First Military District. The 63rd, in command of Capt. N. K. Cameron, of this city, will be trained here, and the 64th, under Lieut. D. W. Walker, R. O., also of London, will be recruited at Guelph.

SENTENCED FOR NON-SUPPORT.

Welland, March 14.—(Special.)—Jess Nelson was to-day sentenced in Police Court to not less than six months nor more than twelve months at Guelph Prison Farm for non-support of his wife and family. He has six children, the oldest of whom is thirteen years.
