

BARON VON POLENZ WILL BE UNDER SURVEILLANCE

BUT AUTHORITIES SAW NO REASON TO KEEP HIM AT FORT HENRY LONGER.

Ottawa, March 21.—Baron von Polenz, a German nobleman, who has been in the internment prison at Fort Henry, Kingston, for some months past, has been allowed to leave the prison under surveillance, and to go to Cobalt, where he is connected with mining interests. The Department of Justice, after taking into consideration all the facts in connection with his case, decided that it was unnecessary to keep him in close confinement longer, especially as there was no evidence of the fact that either prior to the outbreak of the war or afterwards had he given any indication of behaving other than as a law-abiding citizen. His wife is an English lady, and the Baron has been in Canada for a considerable time. At the same time, however, he will be required to report regularly to the authorities, who will be in constant touch with him.
