

A GERMAN PRISONER DIES

IN FORT HENRY INTERNMENT
CAMP FRIDAY NIGHT.

Emil Heyse Had Been Subject to
Heart Disease—Was Arrested at
Niagara-on-the-Lake.

On Friday evening Emil Heyse, one of the German prisoners in Fort Henry, passed away very suddenly. The man was in good health until a very short time before his death. About 8.30 o'clock on Friday evening he retired for the night apparently in his usual state of good health. About half an hour later he was found dead in his bed. On an examination it was found that he had died of heart failure, having been subject to heart disease for some time.

R. J. Reid, undertaker, was called and the remains of the deceased are now awaiting burial at his undertaking parlors. An inquest was not considered necessary.

The late Emil Heyse was born in Germany forty-nine years ago, and lived in that country until about nine years ago, when he came to America. He travelled about the country, and on the outbreak of war was a resident in Canada.

Fifteen months ago he was taken in charge by the internment authorities at Niagara-on-the-Lake, and was sent to Fort Henry. He had been in this internment camp since that time, and was a general favorite among his fellows, and gave the authorities no trouble.
