CHILLIWACK, Sept. 21 .- A query by Ald. Jef. Harrison, chairman of the board of works, at the meeting of

Mrs. Chadsey appeared before the council and applied for a refund of the taxes which she had paid on a boulevard which did not belong to her. Mayor Barber and Alderman R. J. Banford pointed out that the council was convinced that Mrs. Chadsey had paid more taxes than she should have paid, and when the matter was first brought to the notice

of the council the council was willing

to make the refund, but they were in-

formed by the higher authorities that

such a course would be illegal. The

council, however, was willing to re-compense Mrs. Chadsey by making some repairs to the road in front of her property and to the approach to her barn. Mrs. Chadsey thought that if the council could make repairs it could just as easily give her the money that the repairs would cost. She would rather have the money than the repairs. Eventually the matter was left with the finance committee to consider and report at next

meeting. Artist Lee appealed to the council to make some improvements to the approach to his property in return for the taxes that he had paid for the last eight years, and the matter was left with the chairman of the board of works, Mr. J. Harrison. Mr. W. A. Banks, manager of the

Chilliwack Evaporating & Packing Company, to get permission to run the water used for washing purposes into the city's sewer. Mayor Barber pointed out that this would scarcely

be practicable as the sewer did not run in the vicinity of the company's property. Eventually permission was given the company to run the water into a nearby drain and the city decided to put in the connections to the property line.
