

GUILTY OF SEDITION

Charles Clausen Fined Heavily in Red Deer

Red Deer, Alta., Sept. 29. — Charles Clausen, of Red Deer, charged with having spoken words of a seditious nature in the fall of 1915, has been found guilty in the Supreme Court and fined \$500. The accused was charged with having said these words to three persons, two young boys, John and Enar Soderberg, and an American, C. H. Flitcroft, all of whom were neighbors of Clausen. The following were some of the alleged remarks: That if he had King George here he would kill him. That the Germans did right in killing Miss Cavell. That the Germans did right in sinking the Lusitania, and that he hoped all ships carrying Canadian and English soldiers would go to the bottom before they got across. That he would kill all green Englishmen he could. They were all no good and mostly fools and lunatics. The evidence given by Clausen was a denial of having said anything with reference to the war to his accusers.
