

LOSES UNIFORM FOR AIDING INSANE MAN TO ENTER CANADA

Canadian Copper Co. Con- stable Pleaded Guilty to Help- ing Prohibited Immigrant

Sudbury, Ont., Nov. 9.—Lal. Carmichael, a constable at the plant of the Canadian Copper Company, has been stripped of his uniform by the company's Police Chief Moffett, following his having pleaded guilty to assisting a prohibited immigrant to enter Canada. Carmichael was for many years chief attendant at the Newberry, Michigan, Asylum for the Insane and came to Sudbury last August, and was made a police officer on the copper company's force. Some time ago he wrote to one, Harry Graff, a German, who had been 19 years a patient in the Newberry Asylum giving him instructions how to enter Canada and evade the immigration inspectors, and enclosing transportation for him. Graff was stopped by the authorities at Sault Ste. Marie, and on the information secured from him, Carmichael was arrested and arraigned before the Magistrate here. He pleaded guilty to the charge laid against him, and was fined \$150 and costs or three months in jail. He paid the fine and his discharge from the force by Chief Moffett allowed. Traveling Inspector David Reynolds had charge of the investigation of the case.
