

FLIGHT CADETS COLLIDE IN AIR

Machines Were Only Short Distance From Ground When They Met

Two cadets had a miraculous escape from death while flying over the air-drome at the Leaside Camp yesterday afternoon when two machines collided. Both were only a short distance above the ground when the accident occurred. Cadet Rosman was injured about the back and is suffering from a severe scalp wound. He was rushed from the camp in the ambulance to the Base Hospital on Gerrard street in an unconscious condition. He regained consciousness at a late hour last night, and attending doctors stated that the cadet will recover. The other cadet escaped with slight injuries and a shaking up. Both machines were badly damaged.

SAYS HE WAS FREED FROM KAPUSKASING

AUSTRIAN IS CHARGED WITH FAILING TO REPORT AS AN ALIEN ENEMY.

Charged with failing to report to the Chief of Police as an alien enemy, George Adruinchuk, an Austrian, was arrested last night by Policeman Smith.

His story is that when the authorities started to send alien enemies to the **internment** camp at Kapuskasing, he was informed that he could obtain work up there chopping down trees. When he went up he was taken into custody, and after spending a short time at the camp was released. Adruinchuk claims to have a paper which he says the officer in charge of the camp gave him when he was discharged to show that he had been registered.

HORSE ON SIDEWALK

NEW RAILWAY RATES FEB. 1.

It is understood that the increase of fifteen per cent. in freight and passenger rates on all Canadian railways will become effective on February 1. Mileage rates thus advance from 3 to 3.45 cents. The new rates have already been affirmed by the Dominion Railway Commission, and only the detailed schedules of the various lines have yet to be passed upon by the Government officials.
