

# WANT CONTROL OF ALIEN LABOR

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Army and Navy Demand Special Tax on Men of Alien Birth and C.O.'s.

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Insist on Full Details of Men Conscripted in Each Province.

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Registration of every man and woman in the country, the effective control of alien enemy labor, the special taxation of alien enemies, naturalized Canadians of alien enemy origin, and conscientious objectors, were dealt with in a resolution unanimously adopted by the executive of the Army and Navy Veterans in Canada at its meeting last night at the headquarters, 312 Main street, presided over by Lt.-Col. G. F. Carruthers. Secretary Ed. W. Lov' was instructed to forward a copy of the resolution to Premier Borden.

Chas. Midwinter gave notice of a motion favoring no further draft upon the whole country till each province

had contributed equally. On motion of Lieut.-Col. Pousette a request was sent the postmaster-general to allow magazines to be forwarded from Canada to the front for one cent as in Great Britain and the United States.

### Concentration for Overseas.

Premier Borden's reply to the protest forwarded regarding the removal of the members of the 10th Forestry and Railway Construction corps to Hamilton and Brockville indicated that it was necessary to concentrate the men before proceeding overseas, and that there would be a financial saving by eliminating depots wherever possible. Since the operation of the Military Service act recruits for the above mentioned corps had dropped off considerably, and the intention was to do away with unnecessary depots and the duplication of staffs. Regarding the officers being struck off the strength and the men being required to serve under eastern officers, the A. and N. V. decided that was a matter for the military authorities.

Comrade B. Murphy, reporting for the employment committee, stated that another 20 men had been secured for military guards at country points, bringing the total up to 60. Two veterans had been appointed watchmen at the Transcona shops, but greater co-operation and support from employers of labor were urgently required to provide employment for a large number of unemployed returned soldiers.

Any citizens desirous of contributing anything, such as turkeys, chickens, cakes, candy, for the dinner to be given by the Ladies' Auxiliary on Saturday next for families of members serving overseas are requested to send their donations to 312 Main street. It is estimated that about 400 women and children will attend the dinner.
