

# NO LAND FOR ALIENS WHO FIGHT FOR FOE

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, April 22.—The position of alien enemies was considered today by the Senate in the bill amending the Dominion Lands Act.

Senator Bradbury stated that many persons of alien origin, who had come to Canada before the war and made homestead entries, had left Canada when war was declared, and had entered the armies of the countries of their origin and had fought against the British cause. He said that such persons should be prevented, hereafter, from obtaining homestead rights in Canada. In fact, personally, he would not allow such persons ever to re-enter Canada.

Sir James Lougheed said the act provided that a person to obtain a Canadian homestead had to make affidavit that he had not borne arms against the King. However, he would be willing to make the provisions stronger to meet the cases referred to by Senator Bradbury, and the clause was held for further consideration.

## FUNERAL OF MAGISTRATE.

Windsor, April 22.—(Special.)—The funeral of the late Police Magistrate G. J. Leggatt, who died last night, will be held Wednesday afternoon from the family residence, 255 Sandwich street west. Members of the police force will be active pallbearers, and city officials will act as honorary bearers. Burial will be made in Windsor Grove Cemetery. Business will be suspended in the city during the hour of the funeral.

## DOUBLE BEREAVEMENT.

Kitchener, April 22.—Two deaths occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. David Gimbel at Kossuth, four miles from Kitchener, last night, when their daughter, Miss Mary Gimbel, aged twenty-two, died of heart failure, and their daughter-in-law, Mrs. Irvin Gimbel, aged thirty years, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Cressman, died suddenly two hours later when telephoning to a friend. The latter's death was due to the bursting of a blood vessel in the head.
