

'INTERR' NOT 'INTERN' ALL PROVEN TRAITORS

St. Louis, June 14.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, delivering his patriotic address before a large audience here last night, added to his set speech a tribute to Major General Leonard Wood and demanded the death penalty for proven traitors.

"If the United States had followed the advice of Major General Leonard Wood two or three years ago," Colonel Roosevelt said, there would have been 2,000,000,000 men prepared and under arms when war was declared. Russia would never have been broken and peace would have been declared within ninety days after the United States entered the war.

Regarding traitors the Colonel said: "Every traitor in the United States should be 'interred' not 'interned.'"
