Further Disorder Follows Huge Parade Through Streets--Forty Policemen Charge Crowds

Five Thousand Demand That

Aliens' Licenses Be Cancelled

and Unmarried Police Drafted

Want Aliens Deported or Conscripted--Saturday's Loss Total \$80,000

Toronto, Aug. 6.—The Blot act will be read here at noon tomorrow.

Church tonight following a recurrence of the disturbance of last week,

in which returned soldiers, civilians

and police participated. After a meeting in Queen's park at 7.30 this evening, a huge crowd including returned veterans paraded the down-town streets. At the corner

of Carlton and Yonge streets the mob was charged by the squad oľ torty police with their batons drawn. Four persons are officially reported injured and receiving treatment at local hospitals. One of these is returned soldier. Several more peuple received minor injuries in the scrap which followed, but they were able to return to their homes. Five thousand people gathered in Queen's park in response to an invitation of a citizens' committee consider the recent disturbances. Several resolutions, which the mittee had drawn up, setting forth

Five Hundred Soldiers Brought In.

Toronto, Aug. 6.—Five hundred troops have been brought from Nia-gara camp, and are being held at the Exhibition Founds pending call from the civil authorities to suppress any further lawlessness in the city. The troops were brought to Toronto following, the receipt of a regulsition by the military authorities, which was signed by the mayor and two justices of the peace. "It is not a question of not being able to put down the rloters," said Col. H. C. Blekford tonight, "but a question of the legality."
The military, he pointed out, had no right to step in to quell a unless called upon. The first process in calling on the military has

been carried out, and the five hun-

dred soldlers who are now awaiting orders will be used to stop any fur-

ther disturbances, providing a ma-

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gistrate so orders. The military authorities declined. after a conference today with the officers commanding the various military hospitals, to confine the men longer to barracks. The men are to be put upon their honor and asked 10 to keep away from any scenes disturbance. Provided they agree to this, the usual passes will be allowed. Riot Loss Totals \$80,000. damage caused by the riots on Friday and Saturday would total be-tween \$75,000 and \$30,000, which included money stolen from the cash registers. Owing to the losses having been brought about by a mob, only a small amount can be collected from the insurance companies. It was originally estimated that the damage would total about \$40,000. The Retail Merchants' association has pledged that the city will take all steps to guard against a recurrence of Friday night's disturbances, -
