

## HANOVER ALIENS ARE HEAVILY FINED

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)

Owen Sound, Sept. 11.—The Dominion Police have been making a round-up of the delinquents in Grey county for some weeks. They returned to-day from South Grey, where they had an interesting period, during which they laid complaint against three residents of the village of Hanover, which resulted in each being fined heavily. One of the trio was Otto Blum, who on August 3, 1914, attempted to leave Canada to return to Germany, whither he had been called as a naval reservist. When he applied to the German Consul he was advised not to attempt to get across to Germany, as the British would undoubtedly get him on the way. The second was Herman Mitz, a reservist of the German Landsturm, and the third is Henry Osthof, a Hanover merchant, and formerly a Prussian artilleryman. Each was fined \$50 and costs for not having the necessary registration papers, and an additional \$200 and costs for failing to register under the **Allen Enemy Act**.

The cases were tried at Walkerton before the Police Magistrate of that town. The Dominion Military Police discovered that there were between 150 and 200 **alien** enemies who had not registered at Hanover, and Chief of Police Beamish of that village was occupied from 2 to 11 p.m. in registering the **aliens**.

### FOUR CARS SUGAR GONE.

Should be Located in Fairness to Those  
Loyally Conserving.

Kingston, Sept. 11.—A correspondent in writing to a local newspaper states that four carloads of sugar have disappeared in one week in this district, and urges that in fairness to the loyal people who have been conserving sugar the missing carloads should be located by a thorough search.

### ENGLISH MEAT HIGHER.

London, Sept. 11. — The Food Controller announced that the retail price of meat will be increased 2 pence a pound after September 22. The announcement explains that the increase is necessitated chiefly because of the heavier cost of importing meat from America and the rise in freight rates. The Controller also says that the allies have been forced to purchase meat to an unprecedented extent from North America, owing "to the urgent importance of utilizing all available shipping for the double purpose of bringing American troops to the battlefield and supplies to the civilian population."
