MAY BE NERLICH APPEAL While Court of Revision has ruled

that Emil and Henry Nerlich should be entered upon the assessment rolls as aliens, not as British subjects, an appeal to the County Judge may yet be made either by the city's Assess-

ment Department or byb Nerlich brothers themselves. Assessment

Commissioner Forman stated to-day

that he was investigating the merits

of the case, but was unable to make any announcement. The point at issue is whether sons

of a German who became a naturalized British subject when they were minors were thus automatically made British subjects, even though they were natives of Germany. The brothers are still on the rolls as British subjects at their place of residence, though the Court of Revision has changed the assessment at their place of business. It is pointed out that the time during which their residential assessment could be changed has elapsed, but that when voters' lists are compiled from the assesment rolls, an appeal can be made against carrying the names on to the voters' lists as British subjects.
