

BRITISH TO OUST ENEMY ALIENS WHEN WAR ENDS

London, Oct. 25.—Replying to Kennedy Jones in the house of commons, Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer stated that a government committee had carefully considered the question of preventing enemy aliens interned in England from remaining here after the war.

It was undesirable to discuss the matter at the present time, he said, but the government proposals would be introduced in good time.

Replying to Gen. Croft, Home Secre-

tary Cave said that if the German government sanctioned further brutalities to British prisoners this would amount to a deliberate rejection of our recent demands and the government would be entitled to take immediate action.
