Asked about the case this morn ing, a statement given by Chief of Police R. Vincent is to the effect that Peter Nell Martensen, as his name appears on the police records here in 1916 served time at Marquette. Mich for toking allows that the Living the Chief. Mich, for taking allens into the Unit ed States in contravention of the Im-

ed States in contravention of the Immigration laws of that country. After discharge from prison at Marquette, the accused was returned to Canada and was arrested by the provincial police for assisting allens to escape and was fined \$100 or oem month, in jail. The fine was paid. Subsequently the accused was tried on a charge of theft of his wife's property and sentenced to the prison farm at Burwash. He escaped from there but was later arrested at Sudbury, Ontario.

Martensen was a carpenter in this city for some years, and later bought a farm. He has written several letters to officials here, but it is believed his mind of unbalanced.
