## SEND ALL ALIENS NOT WANTED BACK TO NATIVE LANDS

Repatriation Possible Now For Number Not Exceeding 100 Males.

## INTERNED MEN'S PROPERTY SUBJECT TO OLD LAWS

There Are 2,222 Alien Enemies at Various Camps-1,700 Are Germans.

The Dominion Government has decided that all enemy interned prisoners who may be regarded as dangerous or undesirable shall be repatriated with the least possible delay. The Minister of Justice has, erefore, been authorized under the thority of the War Measures Act to Wirect the expulsion, removal or deportation from Canada of all un-desirable daterned aliens. It has been ascertained through the Colonial Office that repatriation is now possible of a number not exceeding one hundred adult males. Give Them Expenses.

Enquiries will at once be made of

the British Government as to what disposition is to be made of the 800 men who were transferred from the West Indies. The property of interned prison-

ers will remain subject to the regulations and powers conferred as heretofore. The restitution or ultimate disposition of such property will depend on the stipulations of the treaty of peace. In cases where the money of alien prisoners is in the hands of the Director of Internment Operations, there may be paid to each of such prisoners upon deportation, a sum not exceeding \$75 as a provision for travelling ex-Are 1,700 Germans. A report from the Director of In-

ternment Operations shows that

there are at the various camps throughout Canada 2,222 enemy allens of whom 1,700 are Germans and the remaining 522 Austrian and other enemy nationalities. Practilaboring class. Of the 1,700 Germans, 800 were transferred from the West Indies and are held at the request of the British Government ....
