

ADMIRABLE ADVICE.

Urging patience and restraint in their efforts to have the Government deal with the enemy alien question, President PURNEY, of the Great War Veterans, appeals to the organization that "the glory of the sacrifices made by never-to-be-forgotten comrades be not dimmed by any hasty or unlawful act of ours." This is admirable advice, and we feel confident that it will find a ready response. The rank and file of the men who went overseas to fight for human rights were the cream of Canadian citizenship, clean, intelligent, law-abiding men, who knew how to distinguish between liberty and license, and their experiences with world criminals and international outlaws were not of a kind to alter their character. They fought to dethrone violence and to establish the principle of ordered liberty in Europe; they are not going to seek to dethrone ordered liberty and establish a reign of violence in Canada. Here and there advocates of disorder may appear in their ranks, but the overwhelming majority can be depended upon to deal with these. Anarchy, lawlessness and license are exotic growths in the midst of men who were willing to make the supreme sacrifice for freedom and justice and right.
