

Soldiers' Alleged Wrong Is Before Alien Board

A tale of alleged wifely unfaithfulness with a German alien while he was away fighting for his country was unfolded by a young farmer before Judge R. H. Myers and his alien investigation board yesterday morning.

Sitting with Judge Myers were the other two members of the board, A. E. Moore, representing returned soldiers, and R. Sutherland, of the Trades and Labor council.

The complainant was a young farmer with three children. He alleged that, while he was away fighting for his country his wife sold his stock on the farm, moved into Winnipeg and used the \$73 monthly separation allowances and assigned pay to live with a German. This German, the complainant said, is employed today by a company in this city.

Powers of Aliens' Court.

Judge Myers heard the case and then advised the complainant that all the board could do was to notify the employers as to the facts and refuse to grant the alien a certificate of loy-

ality so that he could obtain work here with the board's approval.

However, Judge Myers referred him to the order-in-council passed Thursday under which undesirable aliens might be interned by county court judges as prisoners of war. He thought that, if the statements were substantiated, the alien might come under this order-in-council. He, personally, had no power to act in the matter.

The court will resume today at 10.30 a.m.
