

BAR ENEMY ALIENS FOR NEXT 20 YEARS

MEMBER FOR VANCOUVER GIVES NOTICE OF SWEEPING RESOLUTION.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, March 4. — H. H. Stevens, M.P., of Vancouver, has given notice in the House of Commons of the following proposed resolution:

"That in the opinion of the House, the immigration laws of Canada shall be so amended as to absolutely prohibit, for a period of twenty years, entry into Canada of all persons of enemy origin, who, during the period of the war: (a) have been interned in Canada; (b) have been interned in any country being one of the allies of Canada; (c) left Canada shortly before or after the outbreak of the war; or (d) have been guilty of conduct, whether in Canada or any other place, which has in any way jeopardized the place, safety or well-being of Canada or of the British Empire, or of her allies."

Another resolution of which Mr. Stevens has given notice calls for the giving of vocational training to boys who enlisted in the army under age, and who, under the regulations, are not included in the present vocational system.

Private Eric Blenkarn Returns to The Globe
