

ASKS COMMUNITY TO GET BEHIND RETURNED HERO

Col. Mulloy Tells Canadian Club Soldiers' Discipline Will Aid Reconstruction

Lieut.-Col. Mulloy, D.C.M., whose repatriation system now used in Toronto is similar to the Whitley system, told Canadian club members, Tuesday, that the only way to meet the situation is for the community to get behind the returned soldier.

"His army training makes him better fit for community service," Col. Mulloy said. "In army life he was taught that the community comes first, the platoon first, the company first and himself second. In civilian life we term such men public spirited. The returned soldier is just this type. I'd rather have one returned soldier than ten selected immigrants.

"Government regulation of the repatriation problem will never settle it," said Col. Mulloy. "Governments never have and they never will. It is up to you and me, the communities, the soldiers to settle it. The Toronto system is getting results that would have required months of governmental red tape to achieve."

Col. Mulloy will speak later in the week to committees of the board of trade on the methods used in organizing. Col. Mulloy is representing the government in the organization of these committees. It is planned to organize them in Montreal, Winnipeg, Calgary and Vancouver.

The Canadian club unanimously adopted the following resolution, which was sent to Ottawa:

"That all interned aliens and all other aliens guilty of treasonable or seditious speech or action, be deported at the earliest possible date.

"That all Germans, Austrians, Bulgarians and Turks be excluded and also all those who are unwilling to accept the full responsibilities of Canadian citizenship, including military service.

"That the individual tests of immigrants be made more rigid."
