

RUTHENIANS PROTEST AGAINST AMENDMENT

GREEK CATHOLICS FIGHT FOR SELF-GOVERNMENT AGAINST ROMAN CATHOLICS.

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)

Oshawa, May 11.—The members and adherents of the Greek Catholic Church here have sent letters to Hon. Arthur Meighen, Acting Minister of Justice, and to Sir Sam Hughes, expressing their vehement protest against the amendment to the Juvenile Delinquents Act, 1908, in the Dominion Parliament, according to which the Greek Catholics would lose self-government and be known under the name of Roman Catholic and their children in certain cases would be brought up in the Roman Catholic faith.

They say that, whereas the Greek Catholic Ruthenians, in spite of the Polish Jesuits, successfully struggled through centuries in order to preserve the purity of their Eastern ritual, here in Canada they want to be true to the traditions of their fathers, and will never permit the French Bishops in Canada to rob the Greek Catholic Ruthenians of their sacred privileges by incorporating them into the Roman Catholic Church.

They ask Hon. Mr. Meighen to withdraw the amendment, as unjust and harmful to the interests of the Greek Catholic Ruthenians of Canada.

They also request Sir Sam Hughes to voice their strong protest in the House of Commons, and through the Dominion delegates at the Paris Conference, against annexation of their native land of Ukraina and Eastern Galicia, under the Roman Catholic Poland. And they ask him to use his influence that the Paris Conference recognize the independence of Ukraina in her ethnological boundaries.

They appeal to Greek Catholic congregations and clergy all over Canada to protest strongly by sending resolutions condemning the amendment, to the Acting Minister of Justice. The appeal is signed by Juzko Franko, President, and John Whytyn, Secretary.

Fix Boundaries Between Slovakia and Jugo-Slavia
