

SHOULD HAVE POWER TO DEPORT ALIENS

CHIEF JUSTICE MULOCK HAS GRAND JURY AMEND ITS PRESENTMENT

Guelph, May 21.—The Grand Jury in connection with the Spring Assizes now being held before Chief Justice Sir William Mulock presented its report yesterday. The report, however, did not contain any reference to the suggestions given by Sir William at the first sitting of the court in April, when he referred to the lax immigration laws of Canada, and the jury received permission to amend its presentment. Before the jury retired the second time his Lordship again spoke on the alien question, and stated that in his opinion the courts should have power given them to deport criminal aliens no matter how long they had been in this country.

He spoke of Guelph as being a splendid city, that had afforded a welcome to these foreigners to come here and live. They had been treated hospitably, but crimes had been committed. "Where is the immigration officer who should be here to investigate these crimes? He is not here, and there is no machinery to bring him here," said Sir William. "We are now in a very critical period, and I believe a recommendation coming from a Grand Jury would have the effect of bringing about the proper legislation to regulate our laws to better advantage."
