

IMMIGRATION BOARD INQUIRY IN ALIEN CASE

Adjourned To Allow Charges To Be Heard in Federal Courts.

WINNIPEG, July 18.—The Immigration board inquiry into the deportation of the four alleged alien "reds" has been adjourned to July 25, to allow the charges against them to be heard in the federal courts. On Monday these men will be arraigned before Magistrate R. M. Noble on charges of seditious activities. In the meantime they are being kept in detention by immigration authorities.

Arrangements for their hearing in the civil courts and for an adjournment till a week from today, followed by the usual formal application for bail on their clients' behalf, made by Marcus Hyman and E. J. McMurray, filled the afternoon proceedings at the immigration hall today.

At the morning session of the board, Oscar Schoppelrel, one of the four aliens, was ordered to be deported. Defence counsel gave notice of appeal to the minister of immigration. They also intimated that they would make application for a writ of certiorari in the court of the king's bench to quash the proceedings of the immigration board as irregular, in which event application will also be made for a writ of habeas corpus. The decision of the board to deport Schoppelrel was based on two counts, put forth by crown counsel, that his original entry was obtained into Canada by misrepresentation of material facts, and that he refused to answer proper questions put by the chairman of the board and officers of the department.
