ARRESTED AUSTRIAN COUNT

Montreal, Oct. 9.—Arrested at the Windsor Hotel here, where they had registered as Mr. and Mrs. Dunn, on the eve of embarking on the Empress of France for Great Britain, Count Maximilian Egon Potocki was yesterday sent up to Kapuskasing internment camp, while a woman

who was traveling with him was sent back to New York, whence the two had come to Montreal.

Men on the staff of Captain J. N. Carter, registrar of alien enemies, found on the person of the count incriminating papers. One was from Dr. Friedrich Alder, Spartacan leader in Vienna, commenting on the "won-

derful work" the count's mother was doing in Southern Europe, together with a eulogy of Rosa Luxembourg and Karl Liebknecht. In the lining of his hat and in the lining of his overcoat were found addresses of men and women whose names were on Government files in many parts of Europe as people of more or less advanced opinions. Count Potocki was traveling incognito as James Dunn, and his passport showed him

was traveling incognito as James Dunn, and his passport showed him to be a British subject and general manager of a big corporation. When arrested the couple had letters of credit on them for \$48,000 and cash. \$3,673, besides jewelry

worth \$5,000.
