

HUNGARIANS UNWELCOME TO RETURNED VETERANS UPON ARRIVAL IN WEST

VANCOUVER, Nov. 13.—
Twenty-nine Hungarians
are remaining on board an
Okanagan Lake steamer as un-
invited guests of the Canadian
Pacific Railway owing to the
fact that they are not welcome
at their ultimate destination,
Kelowna, where they have been
ordered not to land by a body of
returned soldiers of that town.
Mounted Police who were sent
from Vancouver have so far
failed to solve the problem.

The party, composed of five
men, seven women and seventeen
children, left Moose Jaw, where
they were farming since before
the war, with a carload of house-
hold effects and only enough
money to cover the expenses of
the trip.

After the soldiers refused to
allow them to land a squad of the
R. N. W. M. P. was called and
on arrival at Kelowna arranged
with the soldiers to allow the
party to land.

A new difficulty then arose, for
the Hungarians refused to leave
the boat unless the police stayed
as they feared violence.

Another attempt will be made
to land them to-day.
