

GUELPH AFTER NEW INDUSTRIES

**Chamber of Commerce Has
Organized Committee—
May Form Company**

BIG FOUNDRY COMING IN

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)

Guelph, Jan. 7. — The Industrial Committee of the Guelph Chamber of Commerce met to-day for organization purposes and elected W. H. Burgess as Chairman, J. B. Abler, Vice-Chairman, and G. M. Yates, Secretary. This committee is to work in connection with the Board of Directors in an effort to secure new industries for Guelph. Applications were received from four new industries, which the committee is now investigating. The committee has also under contemplation the advisability of forming an industrial company to erect new factory buildings. This company would cooperate with the City Council, and by its means a promising industry could have erected a factory building should it desire it.

Large Foundry to Open Branch.

The Henry Miller Foundry Company, Limited, of Cleveland, Ohio, is a large industrial concern which has decided to establish a Canadian branch of its business in Guelph. It will occupy the building recently occupied by the Sherer-Gillett Company on the Victoria road, and will add materially to the size. It will manufacture heating apparatus.
