Niemi says that as far as he could tell from the explanation made by the immigration agent there are too many men in Canada now, and ao immigrants are wanted. C. W. Marquardt, general passenger agent of the Copper Range rail-

road, was approached with the prob-lem and he offered an axplanation that might apply to Nikkala, who is not a citizen of the United States, but should not apply to Niemi, who is a citizen. Mr. Marquardt's theory is based on experiences with Italians turned back at Niagara Falls.
