# eigners Out Of Work MANY ARE PENNILESS

## WANT EMPLOYMENT OR TRANS-PORTATION ROME.

Bread Line-at-Ottawa City Hall-They Believed Immigrant Literature, and Came to This Land of . Opportunity. Ottawa, July 3 .- Conditions of un-

enployment in Canada were brought sharply home to the government teaterday afternoon, when some four or five hundred of unskilled laborers, mostly Ruthenians and Ukranians, as sembled outside the immigration of lices and asked for work, or for assistance of some kind. They said that they had come to Canada believing the government's immigration litera ture of recent years that this was the land of opportunity for all. They have been out of work in the capital now for months, and are penniless. It work was not to be had they wanted transportation back to their homes in Central and Eastern Europe, where the bulk of the immigration has come since the present government assumed

The reply of the departmental offi cials was that under existing condi-tions, the government could do little toward, finding employment, except in the case of those who were fitted for and wanted to work as farm inborers. Efforts are being made by the department to send as many of men out on the farms as can be commodated there under the what restricted present demand. Nean while there has been a bread line at the city hall for the past few morn-ings and free food has been supplied by the civic charita office to a limit-

ed extent. In view of similar conditions existing in Montreal, W.nnipeg and other cities, the department is taking steps to arrange for the deportation of all immigrants who have become charges on public charities. Under the immi-gration act any immigrant who be-romes a public charge within three years of his arrival in Canada may be sent back to his home at the expense of the transportation company which brought him out. If municipal authorities request the deportation of any of those now in the civic bread lines, the department will look after their deportation.
